As soon as the coronavirus pandemic pushed spring classes online, MTSU began planning for students' return. In the fall, thousands of students were back on campus—wearing masks and attending classes in rooms modified to ensure social distancing.



MTSU introduced a bachelor's degree in Data Science, as well as a graduate certificate geared toward working professionals in the emerging field, as part of a statewide initiative announced in February in partnership with the Nashville Technology Council.



MTSU and the 118th Wing of the Tennessee Air National Guard signed an agreement in November to collaborate on research in several areas, notably on unmanned aircraft systems operations and computer science.


JANUARY


The General's Fund






Greek Fundraiser

JULY

New Vice Provost



MTSU alumnus Robert Summers is the University's new vice provost for international affairs. Summers, who assumed the

post July 1, wants to increase the number of international students on campus.

"We will be reconceptualizing some of our agreements to encompass more of an exchange component," Summers said.

One possibility: swapping the usual tuition for the host institution's tuition so students don't necessarily pay more.

Summers also wants to reexamine MTSU's study-abroad courses to make sure they are pertinent to students' career goals.





Country music legend and longtime MTSU supporter Charlie Daniels died July 6. Daniels was a passionate advocate for military veterans, and the University's veterans center bears his name.



International Accolade

The Casualty Actuarial Society named MTSU's Actuarial Science program as one of four recipients of its international 2020 CAS University Award Program, noting the innovative and exemplary ways students are prepared for careers in the property and casualty insurance industry.

AUGUST



MTSU's public access TV channel is rebranded as True Blue TV and adds more MTSU's public access TV charmer 3 restrained which airs on Comcast Xfinity campus events to its schedule. The channel, which airs on Comcast Xfinity channels 9 and 1096 in Murfreesboro, was launched in 1999 as a television lesson delivery system for primary and secondary schools across Tennessee.

Back on Campus

With health protocols in place, students began moving into dormitories Aug. 19 and preparing to start a new semester on campus. To mitigate the spread of COVID-19, MTSU reopened residence halls with one student per room and required masks and social distancing.






Faculty Honor

Mary Farone, a microbiologist who began her MTSU career as an adjunct in 1996, was the 2020 recipient of the MTSU Foundation's Career Achievement

Award. Farone was recognized Aug. 20 at the university's Fall Faculty Meeting for her teaching, research, and service to students.

Virtual Convocation

A Michigan pediatrician who investigated the Flint water crisis spoke to new MTSU students in a virtual Convocation on Aug. 22. Mona Hanna-Attisha, whose research led to a \$600 million settlement for those harmed by lead in Flint's water supply, told students they "have amazing power" to create change in the world.



SEPTEMBER

Lunar Rover Award

MTSU's lunar rover Team No. 2 earned NASA's top engineering achievement prize—the American Institute of Aeronautics and Astronautics Neil Armstrong Best Design Award—in the university division. The award recognizes the team whose rover has the best ability to take on the punishing elements in the NASA Human Explorer Rover Challenge course.



Hood 911 Center

Rutherford County renamed its 911 administration and training center in honor of John D. Hood, an MTSU alumnus and current director of government and community affairs for the University. Hood is the center's longest-standing board member and treasurer. Signage with the new name was unveiled Sept. 11.


K-9 Anniversary
